History

The FHWA Retirees originated in 1987, when a group of retirees with ties to Region 6 met with their spouses for a reunion that included a hotel, golf match, hospitality suite, and a dinner. The reunions went national in 1996 and have become an annual event for many retirees. Like clockwork, retirees on the mailing list expect to receive early in the year, a mailing that describes the upcoming reunion and particulars on venue, costs and a reservation form. Red Lindsay, retiree from Region 6, was at the first reunion and has attended all but two reunions since. He provides wonderful continuity to the organization.

Improving FHWA Retiree Outreach

We are happy to report that discussions at last year's reunion in Schaumburg, Illinois, have resulted in follow-on activities and action. First a group of board members and other volunteers developed a questionnaire that was sent to the entire email list. It posed questions about your thoughts on past reunions and requested recommendations for the future. There were more than 200 responses to the questionnaire, which is remarkable. Over 50 respondents, in addition to answering the specific questions, provided written suggestions in a number of areas. The most popular suggestion improving for communications was the development of an FHWA Retiree website. Lyle Renz, our new Chair sent out two memos to the mailing list soliciting help in setting up a website. We are happy to report that Al Steger, a long-time reunion attendee, with significant experience in website development and operation, responded with an offer to take on the task, which was reviewed and accepted by the board and is now in advanced stages of implementation. We will continue to work with FHWA News to provide coverage of retiree activities. In particular we want current FHWA employees to know that FHWA connections do not have to end with retirement. Our membership and the many reunion attendees prove it. Lastly, a website is a destination which users can search. We recognize that we have to do a better job of proactively communicating with FHWA retirees. This newsletter is a start. What's New in Washington

Executive Director - Thomas D. Everett

Tom joined FHWA in 1985 following his graduation from Rutgers and entered the training program. He came up through the ranks as a bridge /structural engineer rising to the Associate Administrator for the Office of Infrastructure before being selected as Executive Director. In this position he is the senior career official in FHWA and manages the day-to-day operations of the organization while advising senior political appointees.

Legislation

We hoped to provide an update on highway legislation, but there is no clear direction at this time. The House, Senate, and White House are all heading in different directions and no one is seeking additional revenues. It looks like we will have to wait until after the elections for direction. In the meantime, some states are moving out with new toll financed managed lanes, peak hour pricing, and innovative public/private partnerships. New vehicles are coming equipped with innovative and even revolutionary safety features. Self-driving cars and trucks are on the horizon. Our colleagues working at FHWA are still dealing with most of the issues we faced, but added on are a host of new issues and opportunities.
